Terminology

<u>Fully Automatic</u>: Multiple shots, one pull of the trigger

<u>Semi-automatic</u>: One shot, one pull of the trigger

<u>Assault weapon</u>: In Maryland law, an assault weapon is defined as

- 1. An assault long gun; PS 5-101
- 2. An assault pistol; CL 4-301
- 3. A copycat weapon; CL 4-301

<u>Caliber</u>: Diameter (in.) of the inside of the barrel or bore (ex. .32 caliber) <u>Gauge</u>: Size of a shotgun ball. The smaller the Gauge, the bigger the shotgun ball.

Quick Facts

Both handguns and long guns can be manual, semiautomatic, or fully automatic

Firearms Storage and Access-Control: Criminal Law Article 4-104

A person **may not** store or leave a loaded firearm in a location where the person knew or should have known that an unsupervised child would gain access to it.

- 1. A child is anyone under the age of 16.
- 2. "Firearm" means a handgun, rifle, shotgun, or short-barreled rifle or shotgun
- 3. "Firearm" does not include antiques
- 4. This does not apply if:
 - The child's access to the firearm is supervised by an individual at least 18 years old;
 - b) The child's assess to the firearm was obtained as the result of an unlawful entry;
 - The firearm is in the possession or control of a law enforcement officer while the officer is engaged in official duties; or
 - d) The child has a certificate of firearm and hunter safety issued under §10-301.1 of the Natural Resources Article.

*Handgun ownership: HQL permit required for handgun sales

*Semi-auto gun / high capacity magazines: Import of assault weapons prohibited; transfer or sale of over 10 round magazines prohibited

*Machine Gun Ownership: State registration; otherwise compliance with federal law

*Firearm law uniformity: Preemption law, uniform throughout state

*Right of Self-Defense: Duty to retreat in public areas

*Open carry: Prohibited in all public areas

*Concealed carry: License required; granted on a discretionary basis; no reciprocity for non-residents with carry permits from other states

*Vehicle carry and transportation: Must remain unloaded and not readily accessible to the driver or passengers; can only transport between areas called out by law

*State Parks: Possession and carry of firearms prohibited except at designated ranges

*Restaurants serving alcohol: Permittees may carry while eating in dining areas

*Duty to notify LEO of permit status: Upon demand of police officer

*Vehicle gun possession at colleges: Subject to college administrative policy
