

**To complete your Supporting Overdose Loss Survivors (SOLS) Program Scholarship Application, ensure you have gathered the following documentation:**

1. The young adult is an Anne Arundel County resident and provides at least one of the following documents:

- utility bill within 60 days
- mortgage/lease statement
- landlord letter
- valid Commercial Driver's License
- bank statement within 60 days
- pay stub
- previous year W-2/1099
- Government-issued documentation, such as a Social Security check, child support order, Department of Social Services food or community medical assistance letter or unemployment award (from last 60 days)

2. The deceased parent or guardian must have been an Anne Arundel County resident at the time of death and provide documentation to verify this.

- utility bill within 60 days
- mortgage/lease statement
- landlord letter
- Commercial Driver's License valid at time of death
- bank statement within 60 days
- pay stub
- previous year W-2/1099
- Any government-issued documentation, such as a Social Security check, child support order, Department of Social Services food or community medical assistance letter or unemployment award

3. Verification of death due to opioid overdose within the past two years (24 months from the date of application).

- Death certificate
- Obituary
- Funeral home invoice
- Police report

4. Verification that the deceased person was the parent, step-parent or legal guardian of the child or children.

- Birth certificate of child with deceased listed
- Marriage Certificate and Birth Certificate: Marriage license linking them to the child's biological parent, alongside the child's birth certificate listing that parent
- Affidavit of Paternity/Parentage
- Baptismal/Church records
- DNA test
- Childcare provider records
